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Editorial



At least 32 people, most of them children and teenagers, have died in the last month in the worst outbreak of Chandipura virus to hit India for over 20 years. The virus which is mainly transmitted to humans by female phlebotomine sandflies is part of the same family of diseases that cause Rabies. The virus can also be transmitted by mosquitoes & ticks. Cases have also been reported in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.

Chandipura virus mostly affects children and teenagers under 15. Symptoms usually appear rapidly after infection and include fever and headache but can develop into encephalitis and cause convulsions, vomiting, seizures, diarrhoea, coma and death. The death rate is currently estimated to be as high as 76% but many infections could be asymptomatic and go unnoticed - meaning the actual fatality rate is likely to be significantly lower.

Health authorities in Gujarat are now racing to contain the outbreak. Over 50,000 people have been screened and all district and rural hospitals have been alerted to send samples of suspected cases to a centrally-run diagnostic laboratory in Pune. Surveillance is also being conducted across nearly 20,000 homes across the state for the presence of sandflies and mosquitoes and around 1500 houses have been sprayed with powder repellent to try and rid the area of the disease carrying insects.

Maharashtra is on alert after Chandipura virus outbreak in Gujarat. The joint director of health services, Dr. Radhakishan Pawar who is heading the vector-borne disease control programme in the state issued an advisory on July 19 to all municipal corporations, zilla parishads, civil surgeons, district health officers and malaria officers in the state. All officials are directed to strengthen comprehensive epidemiological, environmental and entomological surveillance and studies, and conduct house-to-house insecticide spraying.

The advisory recommends that children under 15 years with symptoms such as sudden fever, behavioral changes, convulsions or fainting, should be immediately referred to the nearest primary health centre, rural or district hospital. Blood samples of such patients should be tested for dengue, Japnease Encephalitis and Chandipura virus for

definite diagnosis. Information about these patients with symptoms of vector-borne diseases should be promptly entered into the Integrated Health Information Platform (IHIP) portal, stated the advisory. People should maintain cleanliness in the house and surrounding areas and dispose off dung away from the habitation.

First identified in the mid-1960s in the village of Chandipura near Nagpur in Maharashtra, the virus has caused sporadic outbreaks over the past 80 years. In 2003, 329 children tested positive for the virus in Andhra Pradesh and Maharashtra, with 183 of them dying. An outbreak in Gujarat in 2010 killed 17 people. It is not clear why the virus is now surging again. In India cases of Zika, Malaria, Dengue and Nipah virus all of which are carried by mosquitoes have surged this summer.

Neurological deficits are common in Chandipura infection and can manifest as weakness, loss of coordination or other impairment in motor function. These defects can be long lasting and may require rehabilitation. Signs of meningeal irritation such as a stiff neck, headache, vomiting and sensitivity to light are also frequent.

Treatment:-

There is no specific antiviral agent to treat Chandipura virus and there is no vaccine available as of yet. Early diagnosis and treatment are important. Management of the disease includes managing airways, breathing and circulation through oxygen therapy and ventilation if required. Management of fluid and electrolyte balance, hyperpyrexia, raised intracranial pressure and seizures, prevention of secondary bacterial infection and maintaining nutrition are necessary.

Prevention:-

The spread of the disease can be prevented by vector control - identifying sandfly breeding sites, spraying insecticides, sanitation, environmental control, including the proper storage and disposal of waste and refuse, stopping open air defecation and the use of fly paper. Breeding sites include holes and crevices in walls, holes in trees, dark rooms, stables and storerooms. Prevention of bites is also important through the use of protective clothing, repellants and mosquito nets. Public awareness and prevention efforts focus on educating the public about preventive measures such as maintaining cleanliness, using mosquito nets and avoiding stagnant water around homes. Families are advised to keep children away from potential sandfly breeding grounds.



BENGALURU DECLARATION Bridging the Gaps -

Enhancing Collaboration between Doctors and Patients in India

To

Ensure Unshakeable Trust in the Doctor-Patient Relationship Jointly by

INDIAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

&

PATIENT SAFETY & ACCESS INITIATIVE INDIA FOUNDATION

In continuation of the Trivandrum Declaration dated 12th September 2004 jointly signed by the Indian Medical Association and Consumer Coordination Council, the President of Indian Medical Association (IMA) and the Founder of Patient Safety & Access Initiative India Foundation (PSAIIF) hereby make the following declaration at Bengaluru on Sunday, the 30th June 2024:

- 1. A core group shall be formed with nominees from IMA and PSAIIF to build an institutionalized mechanism to ensure implementation of the recommendations emerging from the declaration
- 2. This collaboration shall
- Develop an actionable vision document for Universal Health Care (UHC) for India in ensuing 12 months.
- II. Work towards increasing the allocation for health in the upcoming Union budget to 2.5% of the GDP, steadily increasing to at least 5% of the GDP by 2030, with allocation for health and social determinants of health being separated.
- III. Set up a 'Patient Information Platform' to empower the patients to make an informed choice.
- IV. Ensure zero tolerance to violence inflicted on doctors and clinical establishments by developing suitable mechanisms.
- V. Encourage elimination of cumbersome, long-drawn processes which affects the efficiency of medical professionals and clinical establishments leading to detrimental impact on healthcare quality and costs.
- VI. Conduct credible research/surveys on healthcare delivery system
- VII. Institute 'ethical branding' for clinical establishments.
- VIII. Work towards making health insurance in the country affordable, transparent, patient friendly and sustainable for all stakeholders.
- IX. Ensure that the services rendered by service providers on behalf of the government shall be paid as per specified timelines.
- X. Conduct joint awareness programs on the roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders within the healthcare delivery system.

- XI. Strongly oppose and put on notice any attempt to dilute patient data protection.
- XII. Ensure patient confidentiality is implemented with an Indian cultural context so as to optimize patient clinical outcomes and strengthening the doctor patient relationship.

The signatories resolve that the widest possible publicity should be given to this declaration and that a copy of this Bengaluru "Bridging the Doctor-Patient Gap" Declaration shall be sent to the Government of India and all State Governments as also to all branches of the Indian Medical Association and all Consumer Organizations in the country.


