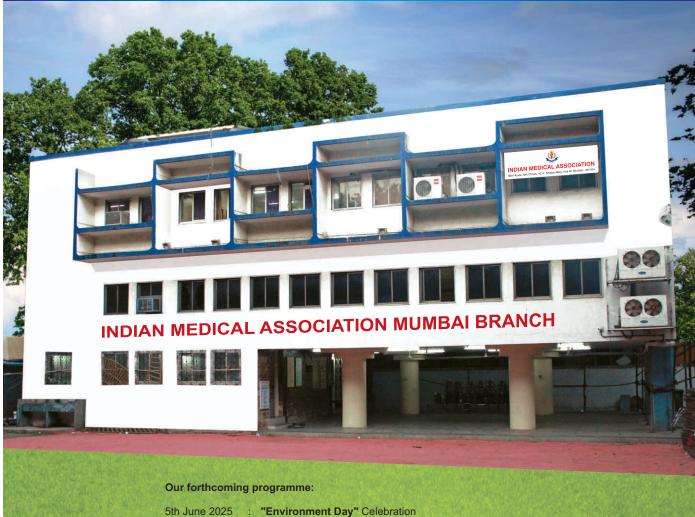

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### **Editorial**

The monsoon season with its refreshing rains and cooler temperatures, brings much needed relief from the summer heat. However it also brings in a surge of viral infections, making it crucial to take



preventive measures to safeguard our health. The combination of increased humidity and stagnant water creates an ideal breeding ground for viruses and bacteria, heightening the risk of illnesses during the monsoon season.

#### 1) DENGUE

Dengue fever is a viral infection caused by the dengue virus transmitted primarily through the bite of infected Aedes mosquitoes. It is prevalent in tropical and subtropical regions. Dengue fever can change from mild flu like symptoms to severe illness, including dengue hemorrhagic fever which can be life threatening if not treated promptly.

- > **Symptoms-** High fever, severe headache, pain behind the eyes, joint and muscle pain(break bone fever),rash and mild bleeding.

  Dengue fever can be diagnosed by blood test to detect the presence of the virus or antibodies.
- Treatment- There is no specific anti-viral treatment for dengue fever. Management primarily focuses on relieving symptoms and preventing complications.
- Prevention- Preventing mosquito bites is crucial in reducing the risk of dengue fever. Elimination of stagnant water, use of mosquito repellents and nets, wearing protective clothing and installing insect screens in windows and doors will help in preventing dengue.

#### 2) MALARIA

Malaria is a life threatening disease caused by Plasmodium Parasites, transmitted to humans through the bites of infected female Anopheles mosquitoes.

- > **Symptoms** Fever and chills in cyclic episodes, profuse sweating, severe headache, nausea and vomiting, muscle and joint pain, bodyache, fatigue and weakness.
- Diagnosis- Blood smears test to detect the presence of Plasmodium parasites and Rapid Diagnostic Tests (RDTs) to detect antigens. These tests help in diagnosing vivax and falsiparum malaria.
- ➤ **Treatment-** Antimalarial drugs like chloroquine, artemisinin based combination therapies (ACTs) and others; hydration, rest, monitoring symptoms and follow up to ensure complete iredication of the parasites and manage potential complications.
- **Prevention-** Avoid mosquito bites by using insect repellent drugs, antimalarial drugs while travelling and environmental control.

#### 3) CHIKUNGUNYA

It is a viral disease transmitted to humans by infected Aedes mosquitoes, the same type responsible for spreading dengue and Zika viruses.

#### Symptoms

Sudden high fever, severe joint pain which can persist for few weeks or months, muscle pain and discomfort, rash, headache and fatigue.

#### Diagnosis

Diagnosis can be made by blood tests to detect the presence of the virus or antibodies.

#### > Treatment

Pain relievers like acetaminophen or paracetamol, hydration and rest. Avoid NSAIDs and aspirine as they may increase the risk of bleeding.

#### 4) **LEPTOSPIROSIS**

Leptospirosis a bacterial infection caused by the Leptospira bacteria, commonly transmitted through contact with water or soil contaminated by the urine of infected animals.

#### Symptoms

High fever, severe headache, chills, muscle aches in lower back and calves, vomiting, jaundice and red eyes.

#### Diagnosis

Diagnosis can be made by blood and urine tests to detect the presence of bacteria or antibodies. H/o wading through flood waters.

#### > Treatment

Antibodies like doxycycline or penicillin, hydration, rest and other symptomatic treatment.

#### 5) TYPHOID

It is a bacterial infection caused by Salmonella typhi, primarily transmitted through contaminated food and water.

#### > Symptoms

Prolonged fever for several weeks, weakness and fatigue, abdominal pain and discomfort, persistent headache, loss of appetite, rose coloured spots on the abdomen and chest, and diarrhoea or constipation.

#### Diagnosis

Blood cultures, stool tests and serological tests to detect the presence of Salmonella typhi bacteria or antibodies.

#### > Treatment

Antibodies like ciprofloxacin or azithromycin, hydration, rest and symptomatic treatment.

#### Prevention

Safe drinking water, avoid raw or undercooked food, hand hygiene and vaccination.

#### 6) Cholera

Cholera is an acute diarrhoeal illness caused by the bacterium Vibrio Cholerae which spreads through contaminated water and food.

#### > Symptoms

Severe diarrhoea often described as "rice water stools", vomiting, dehydration, reduced urine output, lethargy, rapid heart rate and muscle cramps.

#### Diagnosis

Stool sample analysis shows presence of Vibrio Cholerae bacteria.

#### > Treatment

Rapid rehydration by I.V.fluids, oral rehydration solutions, zinc supplements and antibiotics.

#### 7) Gastroenteritis

It is an inflammation of stomach and intestines caused by viral, bacterial or parasitic infections. It spreads through contaminated food and water.

#### > Symptoms

Diarrhoea, vomiting, abdominal pain, fever and dehydration.

#### > Treatment

ORS, hydration, rest, diet.

#### 8) JAUNDICE (HEPATITIS A AND E)

It is a viral infection that affects the liver causing high level of bilirubin in the blood characterised by the yellowing of the skin and eyes.

#### > Symptoms

Yellowing of skin and eyes, dark urine, fatigue, discomfort or pain in right upper side of abdomen, loss of appetite, fever, nausea or vomiting.

#### Diagnosis

Blood tests to detect the virus or antibodies, liver function tests, and sonography or CT of abdomen.

#### > Treatment

Symptomatic and liver function supporting treatment, rest, hydration and balanced diet.

#### Prevention

Safe drinking water, food hygiene, hand hygiene and vaccination.

#### 9) CONJUNCTIVITIS

Inflammation of conjunctiva caused by viral or bacterial infections.

#### > Symptoms

Redness and persistent itching in one or both eyes, watering eyes, thick, yellow or green discharge that can crust over the eyelashes after sleep, and swelling of eyelids.

#### > Treatment

Viral conjunctivitis usually resolves on its own within a week or two. Relieve symptoms with cool compresses and artificial tears. Bacterial Conjunctivitis may be treated by antibiotic eye drops or ointments. Allergic conjunctivitis can be treated by allergy medications or anti-inflammatory eye drops.

#### 10) RESPIRATORY INFECTIONS-COLD AND FLU

These are prevalent during the monsoon season due to increased humidity and fluctuations in temperature which can compromise the immune system. These infections are highly contagious.

#### > Symptoms

Common cold, runny or stuffy nose, sore throat, cough, sneezing, fever, and fatigue.

#### 11) FUNGAL INFECTIONS

Fungal Infections are common during monsoon due to increased humidity and damp conditions and can affect skin, nails and respiratory system.

#### > Symptoms

Skin infections can cause itching and redness, rash, circular or ring shaped rash(ringworm) or small red bumps or blisters. Nail infections can cause discoloration, thickening, cracking or separation of the nails. Respiratory infections present with persistent cough sometimes producing mucus, shortness of breath, wheezing fever and chest pain.

#### Diagnosis

Clinical examination and laboratory tests like skin scrapings, culture tests and chest X- rays or CT scans.

#### Treatment

Topical or oral antifungal medications, antifungal shampoos and hygiene.

Mumbai is witnessing heavy showers since few days. The roads got flooded and the underground metro train witnessed the monsoon for the first time. As we approach the monsoon season, it is crucial to be aware of the pre-monsoon showers and the potential dangers of monsoon related diseases.

The pre-monsoon showers have brought relief from intense heat, but we must be prepared for the monsoon related health concerns.

The increased humidity and water stagnation can create conditions conducive to the spread of various diseases. COVID cases are increasing especially in Mumbai. Though the virus is not as virulent as during 2020 pandemic, a few deaths are reported during last week. It is necessary to use mask and maintain strict hand hygiene to stay safe.

The important waterborne diseases are typhoid and Gastro-enteritis, so water should be filtered or boiled before drinking.

Let us follow the thumb rule 'Prevention is better than cure.' Ensure safe drinking water by using filtered or boiled water because waterborne diseases like typhoid, gastroenteritis and jaundice tend to rise during this season.

There can be increase in vector borne diseases like malaria, dengue and chikungunya primarily due to the breeding of mosquitoes in stagnant water.

Remove all the garbage around our house and buildings. Avoid stagnant water around our homes to reduce mosquito breeding.

The damp and humid environment can exacerbate respiratory conditions such as asthma, bronchitis and other seasonal allergies. Avoid crowded places to prevent respiratory infections.

Let us make conscious collective efforts. Let us remain vigilant and take necessary precautions to ensure health and safety of our community during this monsoon season.

Let us enjoy the monsoon as we can.

#### ALLERGIC CONJUNCTIVITIS AN OVERVIEW

Allergic conjunctivitis results from various factors, including genetics, inflammation, air pollution, atopy, pollen exposure, and contact with pets. Allergic conjunctivitis can convert to keratoconjunctivitis and may result in a visual decline.

Allergic conjunctivitis is a common eye condition that occurs when the conjunctiva becomes inflamed due to an allergic reaction. It is often seasonal but can also be perennial, depending on the allergen.

#### ► Causes

Allergic conjunctivitis is triggered by allergens that irritate the eyes. Common triggers include:

- Pollen (from trees, grasses, and weeds)
- Dust mites
- Pet dander
- Mold spores
- Contact lens solutions or eye drops
- Cosmetics or environmental irritants (e.g., smoke, perfumes)

The condition results from the immune system's over reaction to these substances, releasing histamine and other chemicals that cause inflammation and symptoms.

#### ► Types of Allergic Conjunctivitis

- Seasonal Allergic Conjunctivitis (SAC)
  - Occurs during specific seasons (spring, summer, or fall). Typically caused by airborne pollen.
- Perennial Allergic Conjunctivitis (PAC)
  - Occurs year-round. Often triggered by indoor allergens like dust mites and pet dander.
- Vernal Keratoconjunctivitis (VKC)
  - A more severe form, mostly affecting boys and young men. More common in warm climates.
- Atopic Keratoconjunctivitis (AKC)
  - A chronic and potentially vision-threatening form. Associated with eczema or atopic dermatitis.
- Contact Allergic Conjunctivitis

Caused by reactions to eye drops, contact lenses, or cosmetics.

#### **▶** Symptoms

- Red, itchy eyes.
- Watery eyes.
- Burning sensation.
- Swollen eyelids.
- Sensitivity to light (photophobia).
- Mucous discharge (in more severe cases).
- Symptoms often affect both eyes and may worsen after exposure to the triggering allergen.

#### Diagnosis

Diagnosis is based on:

- Patient history (seasonal patterns, exposure to allergens).
- Physical examination of the eyes.
- Allergy testing (skin or blood tests) in recurrent or severe cases.

#### **►** Treatment

- Lifestyle and Home Remedies.
- Avoid known allergens (keep windows closed, use air filters).
- Use cold compresses to reduce swelling and itching.
- Rinse eyes with sterile saline solution.

- Avoidance of Allergens.
- Stay indoors when pollen counts are high.
- Use air purifiers and keep windows closed.
- Wash hands and face after being outdoors.

#### **▶** Medications

- Antihistamine eye drops Reduce itching and swelling.
- Mast cell stabilizers Prevent the release of allergic mediators.
- Dual-action drops Combine antihistamines and mast cell stabilizers.
- Oral antihistamines Help with overall allergy symptoms.
- Corticosteroid eye drops For severe cases (short-term use only due to side effects) monitored treatment by Ophthalmologist.
- Artificial tears Help dilute and flush out allergens.

#### **▶** Prevention

- Use protective eyewear outdoors.
- Keep pets out of bedrooms.

#### ► When to see an ophthalmologist

- Symptoms persist despite treatment.
- Vision is affected.
- There is pain, discharge, or extreme redness

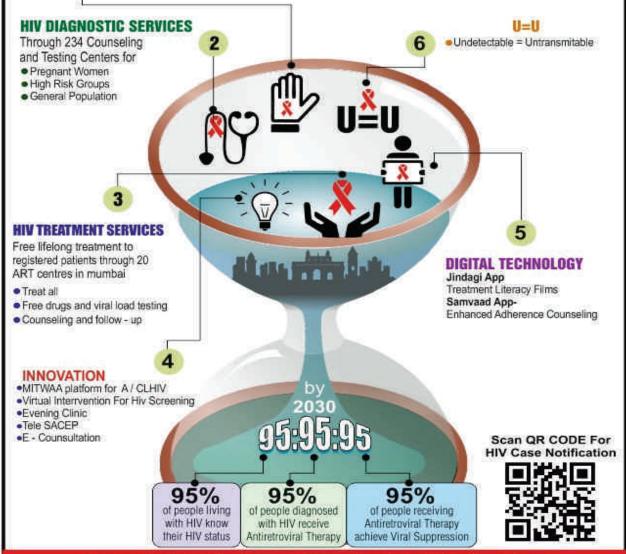

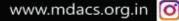
