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Editorial



World Mental Health Day, observed each year on 10th October offers clinicians a unique opportunity to reflect not only on our daily clinical roles but on bridging gaps in prevention, accessibility and equity. In 2025, the focus on “**mental health in emergency settings**” calls us to reimagine how psychiatric care adapts in crisis.

- Every health system is fragile under stress. In disasters or conflicts, mental health care often falls low in priority, though the demand frequently spikes.
- Stigma is magnified - During crisis, societal stigma and fear may further limit help-seeking.
- Long term sequelae - Psychological injuries sustained in emergencies can persist, affecting recovery, social cohesion and community resilience.
- Moral imperative - Clinicians serve as advocates and responders - We must push for mental health being considered essential in humanitarian planning.

Raising awareness about mental health is crucial because it helps societies understand the scale of the problem and the need for timely support. It highlights the causes of mental health problems – Factors may include genetics, stressful life events, chronic illnesses and substance misuse.

It promotes early identification and management. It explains the types of mental health problems like anxiety and depression to more complex challenges such as post-traumatic stress disorder, eating disorders and psychosis.

Mental health is disproportionately impacted in emergencies, yet access to care often breaks down when it is needed most.

- Surge in psychological distress – People exposed to trauma, loss, displacement and uncertainty can develop acute stress reactions, depression, PTSD or anxiety disorders.
- Disruption of services – Health systems get overwhelmed or damaged and continuity of care is jeopardized.

- Vulnerable populations – Refugees, internally displaced persons, children, elderly persons and those with pre-existing mental illness are particularly at risk.
- Integration with humanitarian aid – Mental health must be part of the essential “kit” in disaster response, alongside food, water, shelter and physical health care.

Thus, the theme draws clinical attention to ensuring access to evidence-based mental health care even under difficult, emergency conditions.

Incidence –

Globally around 1 in 8 people live with a mental disorder. In conflict - affected or disaster zones estimates suggest 1 in 5 people may suffer moderate to severe mental health conditions when exposed to emergencies. Large numbers of forcibly displaced people - over 123 million by the end of 2024 are hosted mostly in low and middle income countries where mental health services are often limited.

In India current prevalence of mental disorders is 10.6%, while life time prevalence is 13.7%. Around 150 million Indian adults may need active intervention for mental health issues. Depression and anxiety disorders are the most prevalent with depression affecting about 280 million people globally. Suicide remains a major concern with over 7 lakh deaths annually, making it a leading cause of death among youngsters. The global economic burden of mental health conditions is estimated at over one trillion US dollars per year due to loss of productivity. Alarming 75% of people in low and middle income countries receive no treatment despite clear need.

World Mental Health Day is observed by holding following activities:

- Awareness campaigns (media, social media, posters) focusing on mental health in crisisaffected populations.
- Workshops and training on Psychological First Aid (PFA), trauma informed care, child mental health in emergencies.
- Mobile/field mental health clinics in displaced camps or disaster zones.
- Remote/tele-mental health outreach to connect people in inaccessible or conflict zones to help.
- Policy dialogues with health ministries, disaster management authorities,NGOs to incorporate mental health into disaster planning.
- Community resilience building – peer groups, support networks, psychosocial support programs in vulnerable communities.
- Schools, colleges and workplaces are central to shaping attitudes and providing environments that support mental wellbeing. By addressing mental health proactively, these institutions can reduce stress and create healthier communities. This can be achieved through awareness programmes for students, regular workshops and classroom discussions which help students and young adults recognise mental health issues early and seek support without fear. Trained educators and councillors can identify warning signs, provide guidance and ensure that struggling students do not feel isolated.

Workplace wellness initiatives – Companies are increasingly introducing wellness programmes,

stress management workshops and peer-support groups to encourage a healthier work culture.

Mental health leave and employee assistance programmes- Policies that allow time off for mental health and access to professional counselling services can significantly reduce burnout and improve productivity.

Mental Health in Daily Life -

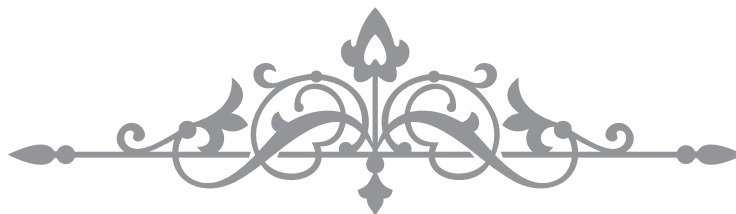
Supporting mental well-being starts with everyday habits and attitudes that strengthen resilience and reduce stress. Simple lifestyle choices can make a significant difference in maintaining good mental health.

- Practicing mindfulness and managing stress – Activities such as meditation, yoga, or journaling help calm the mind and ease anxiety.
- Staying active, resting well and eating right – Regular exercise, proper sleep and a balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables & dietary fibre can support both body & mind.
- Encouraging open conversations about mental health - Talking with family, friends or colleagues reduces stigma and makes it easier for others to share their struggles.
- Avoiding vices.
- Seeking timely professional guidance – Consulting a counsellor, psychologist or psychiatrist should be recognised as a positive step towards healing.

World Mental Health Day 2025 reminds us that mental well-being is a shared responsibility and breaking the barriers of stigma is key to progress. By promoting awareness, improving access to care and encouraging open conversations, communities can build a society where mental health is valued equally with physical health.

With better living conditions rheumatic heart diseases are on the decline. However, Ischemic and Hypertensive heart diseases are rising in the society. Diabetes 13 patients out of which 5 were newly detected, Hypertension 18 out of which 5 were newly detected, URTI 17, Dysmenorrhea 3, Hypo Thyroid 1, Menopausal Syndrome 12, Secondary infertility 2, Severe anaemia 2, Leucorrhoea 2, Eye problems 2, Arthritis 4, Fungal skin infection 5. Total male patients were 49 and female patients were 63. Medicines were dispensed for one-month patients with chronic diseases. Next camp dates are 26th of October 2025.The camp was a huge success Patients were very satisfied. The team of villagers leaders were very helpful in providing volunteers, mobilising patients and taking care of hospitality.
